

# **CAMPSITE 411**

#### What is provided for us at each campsite/cabin?

Although each living unit (tents or cabins) is unique, you can expect to find certain unit equipment in every unit which includes: cast iron for cooking over the fire (one large and one small each dutch oven and frying pans); one rake, metal bucket and broom; one-two shovels; fire extinguisher; three dish pans; one trash can; clearly posted directions to the nearest hospital and clearly posted emergency weather procedures. Some cabins come equipped with almost everything you need for your weekend including kitchens. Others have basic cots or mattresses for sleeping only (you cook over the campfire). Most of our tent units have flush toilets, but some have latrines so read the description for each unit closely! Be sure to bring basic cleaning supplies with you each visit (to wash dishes & wipe down appliances and counters and clean the bathrooms). Each unit has a posted Kaper chart for use when preparing for check out at the end of your visit.

#### When do we submit our troop camping application?

Registration opens on April 1 each year for Troop Camping for the entire Girl Scout year (October thru September). We now have online registration for Troop Camping. Check the live up to date availability before you register. Make sure to list the adult who have completed the Troop Outdoor Certificate and your First Aider/CPR person. Include all adults attending so that we may verify they are registered Girl Scouts and have a completed background check on file.

#### When are the units available?

Always double check the online availability to see when units are available. Council staff host events on site and many weekends are reserved for these programs. Cabin units are open year-round. The Platform tent camping and primitive camping at all camps begins the last weekend of March and ends the weekend before Thanksgiving.

#### How accessible are the units for people who use a wheelchair or have limited mobility?

Accessibility is different at each camp and unit. Each campsite and many of the program areas are listed by camp and campsite so that you can determine if the unit will meet the needs of everyone in your troop/group. Every effort is made to accommodate needs if we have prior knowledge of the need, however we cannot guarantee that every area of the camps is barrier free or wheelchair accessible.

### **Troop Camping Confirmation and Arrival Information**

You will receive an auto reply confirmation with details after you successfully complete your online registration. This will include a form that must be completed and returned listing all the names of all the girls and adults camping. It is due at least two-week prior to your camping date. All payments are due 1 month prior to your camping date. You will receive a reminder notice. One to two weeks before your troop camping weekend, the camp program coordinator will send you an electronic welcome packet to camp requesting your arrival time and confirming your participant numbers. The camp site team stewards the girls' camps and eagerly awaits your arrival.

#### **CABIN VILLAGES - Two villages**

## Each cabin rents separately - see cabin description for capacity

Overnight fee (1 or 2 nights): \$160 per cabin (16 People)

\$200 per cabin (20 people)

Four cabins with bunk beds share a central bathhouse with hot and cold showers and flushing toilets. Cabins are heated/air conditioned and have 4-6 electric outlets. A fire ring and half of a unit shelter is reserved for each cabin. The unit shelter has running cold water, a charcoal grill, 3 picnic tables, several storage cabinets, and two electric outlets. Troops cook over the fire ring or charcoal grill – there are no kitchen facilities. **The sleeping arrangements in these units do not support female and male mixed group overnights.** No crafts containing glue, glitter, paint, wax or tie-dye inside the cabins – these must be done in outdoor shelters. Please store all food in the outdoor storage cabinets – not in the cabins. **Firewood is provided.**

The general terrain is mostly hilly and slightly steep on the trail with access from the gravel road. Three of the fire rings have level roll-in access. Entry into the bathroom is flat once you get to the concrete. There is one accessible toilet stall with raised stool and grab bars. The shower stalls have grab bars, flexible shower head with hose, shower seat and a raised lip entry <b>that does not permit roll-in</b> . Marty Browne has ramp access; the other three cabins have four or more steps to porch entry.  Village 1 is reached via a gravel road.
Village 2 - Pine Tree Cabin Overnight: Maximum 16 people Pine Tree and Rhodes Share a Unit Shelter	Village 2 – Rhodes Cabin (cabin is remote and has a bathroom) Overnight: Maximum 20 people This cabin is furthest from the bathhouse and is slightly remote. There is a small bathroom with two stalls in this cabin.	Parts of this unit are accessible to a person using a wheelchair or with limited mobility. The general terrain is mostly hilly and slightly steep on the trail with access from the gravel road. Three of the fire rings have level roll-in access. Entry into the bathroom is flat once you get to the concrete. There is one accessible toilet stall with raised stool and grab bars. The shower stalls have grab bars, flexible shower head with hose, shower seat and a raised lip entry <b>that does not permit roll-in</b> .
Village 2 - Sullivan Cabin Overnight: Maximum 16 people Nightingale and Sullivan Share a Unit Shelter	Village 2 - Nightingale Cabin  Overnight: Maximum 20 people This cabin is closest to the bathhouse with a flat approach. The interior of the cabin is open and allows for easy wheelchair movement.	Nightingale has ramp access; the other three cabins have four or more steps to porch entry. Village 2 is reached via a gravel road and is slightly farther from the parking lot than Village 1.

Centrally heated and air-conditioned building with 26 mattresses for sleeping – carpeted stage. Leader room with one bunk bed and private half bath. Full kitchen includes refrigerator, stove, pots, pans, dishes, utensils, garbage liners, coffee maker and toaster – bring your own cleaning supplies. Full bathroom includes toilets, showers, toilet paper, hand soap and paper towels. Tables & chairs provided.  The sleeping arrangements in this unit do not support female and male mixed group overnights.  Outdoor – Fire ring	Most of this unit is largely accessible to a person using a wheelchair or with limited mobility. The general terrain is level and flat. The fire ring has level roll-in access. Entry into the front of the building is level and entry through the rear is by a short, low ramp. This unit is closest to the parking area. Entry into the bathroom is flat. There is one accessible toilet stall with raised stool and grab bars. The shower stalls have grab bars, flexible shower head with hose, shower seat and a raised lip entry which <b>does not permit roll-in</b> .
WHITNEY GROVE TROOP HOUSE Overnight: Maximum 16 people Overnight fee (1 or 2 nights): \$210 No crafts containing glue, glitter, paint, wax or tie-dye Firewood is provided.	garbage liners, coffee maker and toaster – bring your own	Most of this unit is largely accessible to a person using a wheelchair or with limited mobility. The general terrain is mostly level and flat with a slight slope on the trail from the gravel road to the building access ramp. The fire ring has level roll-in access. Entry into the bathroom is flat. There is one accessible toilet stall with raised stool and grab bars. The shower stalls have grab bars and a flexible shower head with hose, but no shower seat and a raised lip entry <b>which does not permit roll-in.</b>
