From kindergarten through high school, Life Skills programs (including skill-building badges and Journeys) form the foundation for a lifetime of growth in every aspect of girls' lives. Whether girls are learning how to form healthy relationships, volunteering for a community service project, or creating their first budget, they're gaining skills and inspiration to overcome obstacles.

Girls still face health, academic, social, and financial challenges as we begin to move forward from the pandemic, so it's essential that they continue to learn and grow. Through Girl Scout programs, especially Journeys, girls learn social-emotional skills that embolden them to team up to with others to identify problems, develop creative solutions, create and implement plans, and celebrate their shared accomplishments.

## Some of the areas they explore include:

- Healthy relationships: From Daisy to Ambassador, Girl Scouts form stronger connections with their families, friends, and communities. Younger girls make new friends as they strive to be considerate, caring, and kind. Juniors can earn the Bronze Award by teaming up with other girls to make a difference in their towns. In middle school, girls learn to cope with bullying and relational aggression. During this time, Cadettes can earn the Silver Award by researching an issue, making a plan, and taking action to improve their communities. Seniors and Ambassadors who earn the Gold Award tackle issues that are dear to them and drive lasting change in their communities and beyond. Think of the Gold Award as a key that can open doors to scholarships, preferred admission tracks for college, and amazing career opportunities.
- Community service: Whether they're planting a garden, painting a mural, or launching a letter-writing campaign, girls who complete the It's Your World—Change It! Journey get inspired to take on leadership and advocacy challenges and discover what it means to make a difference in the world. Some girls pursue their Gold Award—the highest honor in Girl Scouting—by tran forming an idea and vision for change into an actionable plan with measurable, sustainable, and far-reaching results. The award acknowledges each courageous and visionary recipient's power and dedication not only to bettering herself, but also to making the world a better place for others.
- Civic engagement: Girl Scouts prepares girls to be informed, active community members.
